

I concluded last fall's newsletter with the following paragraph.

The final major goal for next year will be summer youth programs centered around golf. Learning the sport is more than teaching how to swing a club. It includes life lessons that build character and self confidence. The program will also offer educational and enrichment activities that give kids an opportunity to visit city attractions.

I'm happy to report that prediction came true! But there is a side story to this chapter of our work that I would like to share.

Our friends at Family Golf and Learning Center provided an excellent location for our golf experience along with lunch for all the kids. That was great, but it's what happened during one of our golfing practices that deserves repeating!

Sports television personality Joe Buck was visiting the pro shop when the golf class was hitting balls. He saw us on the driving range and wanted more information about the Foundaton. Owner Adam Betz gave him my name. Jack contacted me and asked how he could help. I didn't hesitate long and replied, "The kids need computers so that we can continue the Golf, Opportunity, Learning & Fun Program (G.O.L.F)." His response, "I can do that!"

> After a couple of additional telephone calls our office received about \$9,000 and we purchased notebook computers for the kids.

College Hill Residents See the Fruits of Grants and Lavender Harvests

The College Hill (CH) neighborhood consists of residents of all ages. But perhaps no age group is more affected by the economy than the elderly. Many of these residents moved into CH in the 1970s and '80s, bought homes and raised families.

Now their incomes are fixed and continuing to maintain their homes is very difficult. CHF grants are applied to situtations and living conditions that need home improvements.

We briefly visited three women who are faced with maintaining a home, sometimes for extended family members.

Ms. Blackmon (87) says the neighborhood has changed in the 37 years she has lived in her house. "It can be bad here, but we get along," she added. The CHF learned that a long-time unfinished bathroom remodelling project was creating

a difficult situtation.

That difficulty was remedied recently when the CHF granted Ms. Blackmon a new bathroom and hot water heater.

"God bless the people who helped get me this new bathroom," she says. "They really did some good for me."

Ms. Watson says of the CHF, "We still have someone in CH that can help us." The work on her home has included tuck pointing, ceiling repair and a new furnace.

Ms. Crenshaw has lived and been active in CH for many years. She moved there in 1970. "There have been plenty of groups come here to help over the years," she says. "But the Foundation and the folks from out in the county have stuck with us. You can count on them."

She says her walker was getting tangled in a broken front sidewalk. "They (CHF) fixed the sidewalk and repaired a roof that was leaking right over my bed.

"It's been great to get to know the volunteers who have helped the neighborhood through the years," she added.

The St. Louis City Senior Fund, Trio Foundation of St. Louis and Marillac Mission Fund provided grants to help assist with home improvements.
